## Watervliet issued coliform bacteria warning letter required by DEQ

# City water safe to drink; broken pipe caused "bad" sample; red tint and taste due to extra chlorine added during construction project

At the end of June, municipal water users received a letter from the City of Watervliet advising them that a recent sample of the water violated a drinking water standard. The sample showed the presence of coliform bacteria.

According to a telephone statement by City Clerk Susan Openner, the City routinely monitors for drinking water contaminants. They collected five samples to test for the presence of coliform bacteria during June of 2007. Two of the five samples showed the presence of coliform bacteria. The standard is that no more than one sample per month may do so.

Openner said that contaminated samples could be caused by mishandling of the specimen and have nothing to do with the true purity of the water.

Mark Bolin, Watervliet's Licensed Superintendent of Water, said that the contaminated sample did not mean that the water was unsafe to use or drink. He pointed out that when a "bad sample" is taken, he is

then required by the DEQ to take samples four houses down on either side of the contaminated site. Both of these samples were clean.

He then dug up the sampling station in question and found that a copper pipe had frozen during the winter and burst, causing the water sample to be tainted.

Bolin said that the very next day he took six more samples up and down the line and found them to be negative for any contamination.

He said one of the requirements of the DEQ when a tainted sample is found is to send letters out to the public, which was done, even though the situation was never a threat to the community.

Bolin added, "The DEQ's main interest is safeguarding the community." So the letter made many uncom-

fortable and concerned about their water safety, when all along there was no danger.

Alan Smaka of Wightman & Associates, engineer on the water project, said the potential pollution of the water had nothing to do with the \$2.5 million water project, as Dunigan Brothers was putting in the new water main at the time. He indicated it probably was a coincidence, and Bolin concurred.

According to Bolin, the City disinfected the distribution system and continues to chlorinate the water system until the construction projects are finished sometime in August 2007.

He said that the City's water might have a slight red tint to it and could have a "different" taste due to the chlorine being pumped through the

system.

Bolin said now that the water tower painting project is completed the water coming from it "is crystal clear and the best quality I've ever seen."

Bolin stressed they will continue to monitor the water system and are increasing the number of bacteriological samples to be sure the water remains safe for consumption.

According to Smaka, painting of the water tower has been finished. That project cost \$140,000 and was completed by L.C. United Painting Company of Sterling Heights.

The well house and pump apparatus is being finished by Langshaw Farms at a cost of \$219,000.

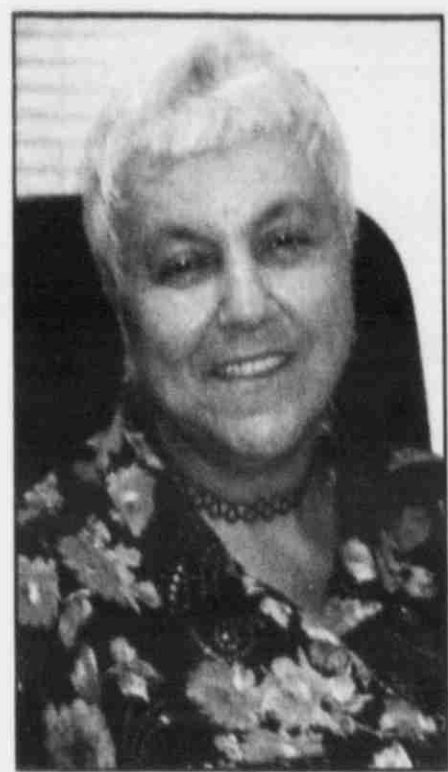
The laying of the water main is winding down West Division Street to East Division Street to Sutherland

Ave-nue, then back to Red Arrow Highway, Smaka said.

This part of the project is being completed by Dunigan Brothers at a cost of \$1,613,117.

Yards, roadways, and sidewalks will be restored at the end of the water main project, Smaka had told the Watervliet City Commission at its last regular meeting.

The entire project should be completed by the end of August 2007.

### Martha Darling named Glad-Peach Honorary Citizen

After 33 years, Darling is making plans to retire soon from her job as an Avon representative. However, she intends to keep serving as Coloma's City Clerk for as long as the community needs her.

## 40th annual Glad-Peach Festival; something fun for all ages

The 40th annual Glad-Peach Festival gets under way on Friday, August 3; with festivities through Sunday, August 5. A few events begin on Thursday, August 2. Festival visitors will find a variety of contests, events, food, entertainment, and fun.

### Something old

For almost 30 years, North Berrien Historical Society (NBHS) members have come to the festival to raise money for the Museum. Member Donna Dill said they started selling pizza in 1979 and later switched to selling ice cream.

This year, they will be selling a variety of cones, fresh peach sun-dae, chips, chili dogs, chili/cheese dogs, hot dogs, pop, floats, cotton candy, and water at the Cone Barn.

They will open at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, 11:00 a.m. on Friday and Sunday, and at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday. Member Elma Doty said they will be open each night until "all the people get their cones."

They will also have a Bake Sale starting at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday.

Other items for sale are videos and DVDs on the Coloma and Paw Paw Lake Area, along with the NBHS cookbook called "Stirring Up Memories."

NBHS President Edith Munchow said they are easy to find. "Just look for the big, red barn," she said.

### Something new

The Bean Bag Tournament at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday is a new event this year, sponsored by Budweiser and co-chaired by Karen Demis and Roseann Clements. It will be located behind the Easy Street Inn by the beer tent.

Adults 21 and over will be eligible to test their accuracy at throwing the bean bags. All entry fee money will be donated to the Glad-Peach Festival.

Clements said the contest gives adults a game to play after the parade, is good for business, and helps the festival financially.

"It's a win-win situation for everyone," she said.

Demis said they had thought about doing it for a long time and she expects it to be a lot of fun.

"They are going to have a great time," she said.

The official opening of the Glad-Peach Festival is Friday at 6:30 p.m. Mistress of ceremonies is Brenda Layne from 1400 WSJM.

The Prince and Princess Coronation is at 6:45 p.m. and is followed by the Youth Parade at 7:00 p.m. Parade winners will be announced at 7:45 p.m.

Chairman Samantha Quigley said applications for the Youth Parade can be picked up at City Hall and either mailed back to her or dropped off at the Coloma Fire Station by 12:00 noon on Friday (August 4). The annual Glad-Peach Parade begins on Saturday at 1:00 p.m. Parade Chairman Joan Bell said there is still time for people to enter. Applications can be picked up, filled out, and turned in at City Hall.

Miss Coloma and Mr. Coloma, along with their courts, will reign over the festival. At this time, there are no suspects. If anyone has some information

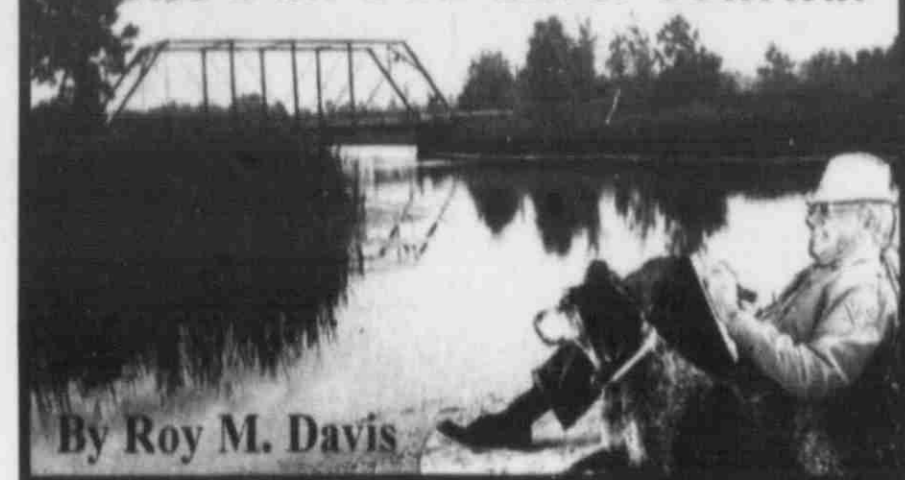

**Early Car Thieves**

Nothing happened for several days, and then in the first week of November the mail had come in. At the post office in the new bank building, Postmaster W.H. Blashfield was holding a letter in his hand. It was addressed to "Postmaster, Hartford, Michigan."

He opened it and there was the first clue to the whereabouts of the stolen Buick. It read:

"Model 1917. Stolen car. To the owner of the Buick car, license 69834, six-cylinder. Come and get it in Springfield, Illinois."

Inside the envelope was also a garage ticket, no. 429, showing that the car had been stored in Springfield at the Chevrolet garage.

Tom Doyle immediately notified Sheriff Beattie and the insurance company representative who went to Illinois to bring the Buick back. The note and ticket were so unusual; authorities felt that Tom Doyle's car was stolen for a trip rather than for resale.

They found the Buick in Springfield all right, but Tom's joy turned to sadness when they told him the car was so badly damaged they might have to sell it down there instead of bringing it back to Michigan and, thereafter, settle the claim in cash.

They got the abused car back to Hartford, and it showed evidence of hard usage when it was returned. Tom undoubtedly felt there should be a special anteroom in hell for the miscreants who would do such a thing to one of his most prized possessions.

In a post script to the story, Sheriff Beattie felt they finally unraveled the case... well, sort of. In Chicago, two Italian laborers were arrested and tried for stealing a car in that city. They drove it clear to northern Michigan and back to Hartford where they offered to sell it at an unusually low price. Then they abandoned it in Bangor, and thereafter their trail went cold. But they were finally connected to the car found in Bangor.

How did they get from our area back to Chicago? Sheriff Beattie felt sure they went in the Buick. So he attended their trial on the other theft which was held in Chicago. And he was armed with warrants for their arrest. In case they got off he would be waiting to put the cuffs on them for the Hartford caper. But it never happened... the thieves went to prison in Illinois.

What happened to Tom's Buick? Although it showed evidence of

hard usage, it was ultimately repaired. But you know how it is... sometimes when a car has been damaged, it never seems the same, even if the repairs are skillfully done... especially if it has been in the hands of bad people!

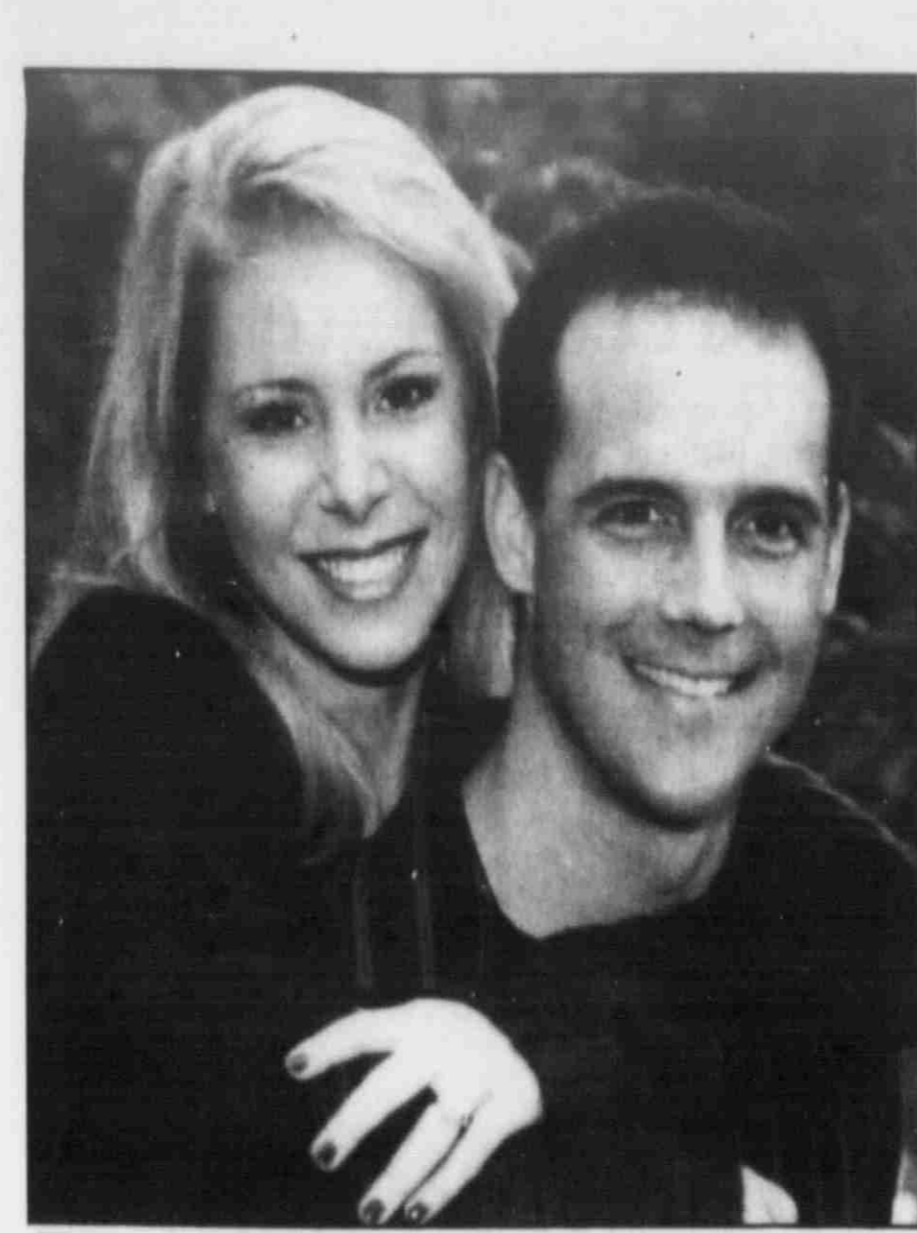

**Hartford School Board report**

**Dual sport participation eyed; athletes would prioritize sport in event of game conflicts**

The Hartford Board of Education held its regular meeting on July 19. One of the first orders of business was to approve the State School Bond Loan Revolving Fund Resolution.

Business Manager Michael Hallgren told the Board this was one of those things that was necessary to do each year. This is for the loan the School District takes out each year until the district's funding from the state is given to them because it comes after the fiscal year begins.

Athletic Director Dave Janicki presented a proposed policy to the Board that would allow dual sport participation for students. This would allow students to play in two sports, whereas now they are only allowed to participate in one.

Janicki explained that he and the other coaches have come up with several rules that would, hopefully, prevent problems they had thought might come up. The first problem they addressed was preventing a conflict if both sports were taking place at the same time.

Each student would be required to prioritize the two sports he or she wants to participate in and the first-choice sport would take precedence over the second one.

Janicki said there is only a handful of students who could handle it both physically and mentally to play in two sports. This is why another of the rules would be that the student would have to be qualified for varsity-level sports.

The benefits to having students playing in two sports would be a bolstering of team moral and scoring capabilities.

The Board is considering the proposal and will address it next month.

**School personnel**

Hartford School District Superintendent David Levstek told the Board that the girls junior varsity basketball position had been posted this last week.

Superintendent Levstek told the Board that the district had received 25 applications for the posted position of elementary art teacher. He said the committee would meet to review the resumes and would interview four candidates on Friday.

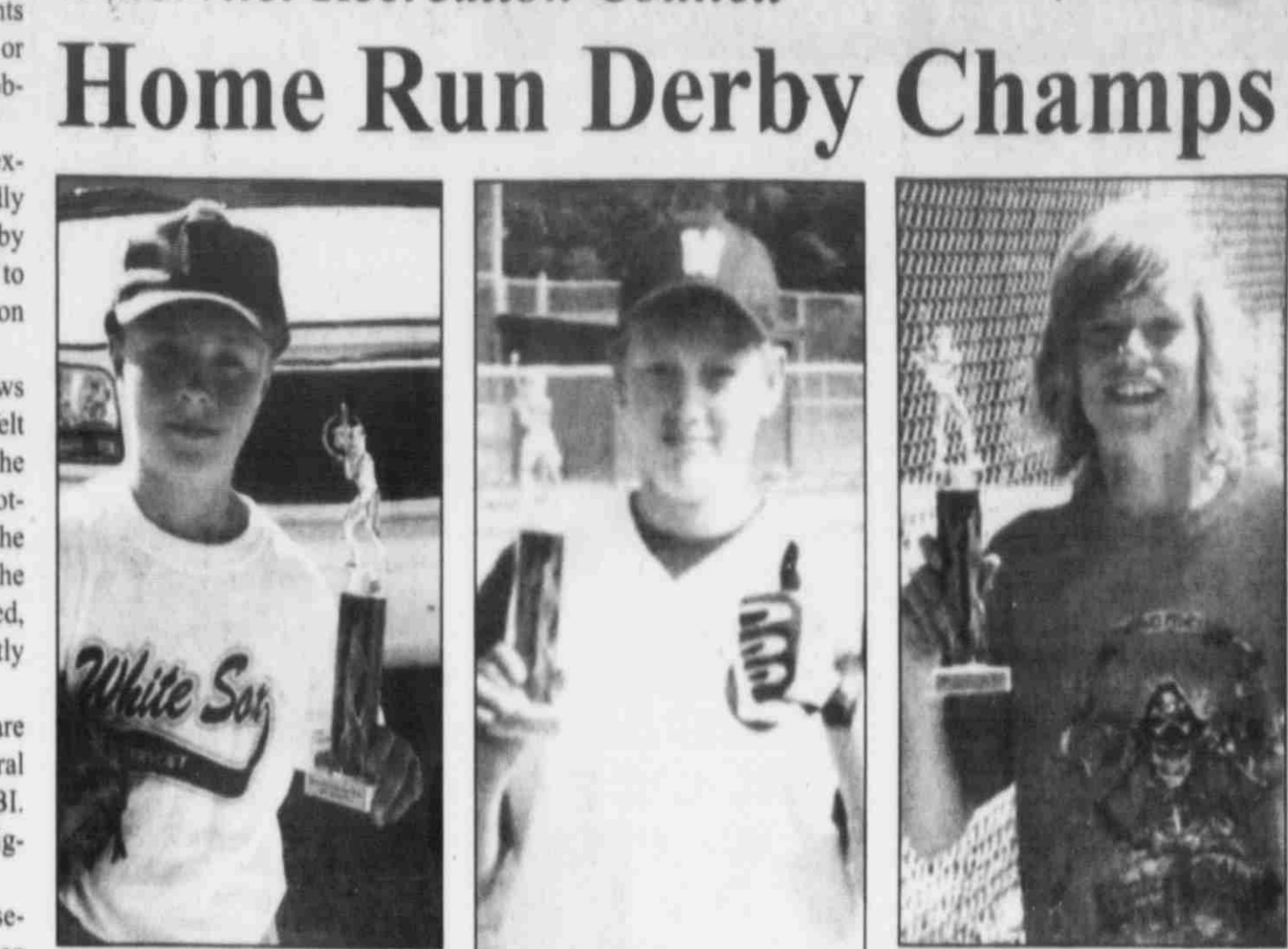

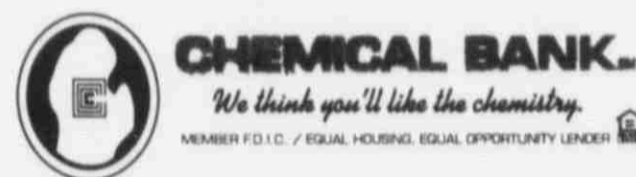
