## Tyler Carr family may seek justice in the civil courts, attorney says

News last week that the Berrien County Prosecutor was not going to seek criminal charges in the death of Tyler Carr may mean closure in the criminal courts but not in the civil courts. The Carr's attorney, Kevin Anderson, released information late last week that may lead to an appearance in the civil courts for the driver of the vehicle that ran Carr over or others they may see as in some way

Tyler James Carr, 21, was found Sunday morning, March 25, lying in a field in Pipestone Township. Carr had been at a party at the 2561 Fairview Road residence of Valerie Elliott the previous evening. Berrien County Prosecuting Attorney Arthur Cotter told the Carr family last Monday, September 10, that based on the evidence presented to him; he would not be seeking criminal charges against the driver or anyone else.

Cotter said that Tyler Carr was accidentally killed when he was run over by a vehicle driven by Tyler Schultz, 20, while Schultz was leaving the same party. Schultz was driving a 1999 Ford F250 diesel truck and was


The Lulls produced a book – with a printing run of about 20 copies - that describes the genealogy and history of these German-to-Bainbridge families.

**Supplemental Security Income: Forty years of** helping people in need

The Social Security Amendments of 1972 created a new federal benefit program. This month, that program the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program — celebrates its 40th

Administered by Social Security, SSI is a needs-based program for people 65 or older, blind, or disabled who have limited income and resources.

For income, we count things such as wages, Social Security benefits, and pensions. However, Social Security does not count all of your income when it decides whether you qualify for SSI. For example, we don't count food stamps or most home energy

For resources, we count the things you own, such as real estate (other than the home you live in), bank accounts, cash, stocks, and bonds. A person with resources worth no more than \$2,000 may be able to get SSI. The resource limit is \$3,000 for cou-

To qualify for SSI, you also must live in the United States or the Northern Mariana Islands and be a U.S. citizen or national. In rare cases, noncitizen residents can qualify for SSI. If you live in certain types of institutions or live in a shelter for the homeless, you may qualify for SSI.

People with blindness or a disability who apply for SSI may be able to get free special services to help them work. These services may include counseling and job training.

The monthly maximum federal SSI payment is the same nationwide and amounts to \$698 for an individual and \$1,048 for a couple. However, the amount you receive depends on factors such as where you live, your living arrangements, and your income. Some states add money to the federal payment.

Funding for the SSI program comes from the general revenues of the U.S. Treasury, not from Social Security payroll taxes.

Radon is a gas that comes from the natural breakdown of uranium and radium deep within the surface earth's surface. These elements are found everywhere in the world. Radon is an inert gas, which means it does not combine with elements in the soil. Because of this, radon gas can move up through the soil into the atmosphere, where it is easily diluted and presents no health concern. However, when radon enters a building, generally through the basement, it can build up and become a health concern. Human trafficking occurs if a person is induced to perform labor or a sex act through force, fraud or coercion. However, any minor who performs a commercial sex act is considered a victim regardless of any factors.

While we don't often think about this terrible crime happening in our great state, unfortunately it does. That is why Michigan's human trafficking laws were strengthened in 2010. In March, Attorney General Bill Schuette secured the first conviction under the new laws. A 32-year-old Detroit man was convicted on 8 counts for enslaving two girls age 14 and 15 and forcing them to engage in prostitution. Five other defendants are currently facing human trafficking charges right here in Michigan.

The Watervliet School Board Goals Committee has been working the last several months to consider options for a Facilities Plan. The committee considered input from

the Community Forums held earlier this year, analyzed data, and reviewed current plans for upkeep and development of school buildings. As a result, the committee brought a recommendation to the board at their September

"To answer some of these questions about what needs to be done with the facilities in our care," said Superintendent Kevin Schooley, "it is time to consult with professionals."

Schooley and the Goals Committee interviewed two architectural/engineering firms, ultimately recommending GMB Architectural Engineering to complete a comprehensive facility study to plan for the long term care of Watervliet Public

School buildings. The initial study, according to board and goals committee member Andy Bodfish, will be the basis of a ten-year plan. "The community forums magnified the need for this type of interven-

tion," said Bodfish. The board voted unanimously to commission the firm to complete a comprehensive facility study, at a cost not to exceed \$15,000.

## Consumer Bureau is off to strong start

By Sen. Carl Levin

When Congress passed the Dodd-Frank Act to reform Wall Street in the aftermath of the financial crisis, one of our most important steps was an attempt to help level the playing field for consumers in the complicated markets for mortgages, credit cards, consumer loans and other financial products by establishing the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau.

Just as federal agencies protect consumers from harmful food products or pharmaceuticals, the CFBP is designed to help protect consumers from abuses in financial markets. The agency is required twice a year to report to Congress on its activities, and in early September, CFPB Director Rob Cordray gave us a promising report card.

Senate Permanent As my Subcommittee on Investigations has shown, shoddy mortgage lending practices were one of the major causes of the financial crisis. Too often, lenders sought short-term profits by giving loans to consumers who couldn't pay, or deceiving borrowers about the cost of loans, leading to the housing collapse that hurt nearly every American family. Director Cordray explained how CFPB has begun writing rules that will simplify mortgage disclosure forms, so that consumers can clearly understand the terms and costs of a loan.

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

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#### **Fishing**

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) weekly fishing tip was how to catch Crappies in the fall. Although plentiful and easy to fish for in the summer, Crappie can be difficult to target as the weather cools off.

They recommend anglers should target higher oxygen areas in the lake, like where streams dump into the lake, or where the wind and waves are

Try a variety of baits, and remember when it's very sunny out, Crappie will stick close to the bottom. But when it's cloudy, they're likely to be within a few feet of the surface.

The DNR said the fishery for adult Chinook Salmon on Lake Michigan is starting to wind down, however Steelhead and younger salmon can still be found in deep water. Trout and Salmon fishing in the river systems is difficult due to the low water levels, but inland lakes are producing Bass, Pike, Crappie, Perch and Bluegills across the state.

Pyle's Porthole in South Haven said some nice Bluegill and Crappie catches in the area have been taken from Lake 14, Lake 11, and Bear Lake.

Anglers are catching their limits of Perch south of the South Haven piers in 40 to 50 feet of water. Salmon and Steelhead can be found down deep in 100 feet of water on Lake Michigan straight out and to the north of the

Steelheads are hanging around the piers and South Haven anglers are catching some nice ones. Coho and King Salmon are being taken on the Black River along with some nice

Fishin' Hole #2 by Coloma reports a few Coho and King Salmon are being caught in the Paw Paw River with spoons, spinners and hot-n-tots. They are also catching some at the St.

Joseph pier also. Some nice Catfish are coming out of the St. Joseph River. Monday morning the St. Joe Fishin' Hole had a nice big Flathead Catfish come in to be weighed and it was approximately 40 inches long and weighed in at 40 pounds.

Big Paw Paw Lake is still producing some nice Pike in 15 to 20 feet of water using crank baits and Pike shiners. They also were catching some Walleye while trolling with inline spinners. Very nice catches of Crappie were reported out of Van Auken Lake and Maple Lake had some good Bluegill catches.

A new state record for a Black Buffalo fish has been set by Bryan DeGoede in Allegan County. The record Black Buffalo, a member of the sucker family, was caught by DeGoede on the Kalamazoo River on September 5. The fish weighed in at 37.4 pounds and measured 39.3 inch-

State records are recognized by weight only and the fish must exceed the current listed state-record weight and identification must be verified by a DNR fisheries biologist.

DeGoede who is from Kalamazoo was bowfishing when he landed the record fish. The previous state-record was caught by Brad Nietering of Nunica in Ottawa County on May 19, 2004. For more information about record-breaking fish caught in Michigan, visit www.michigan.gov/masterangler.

Because of the low Lake Michigan water levels, portions of Betsie River and Betsie Bay will be closed to fishing from October 10, 2012 until further notice to protect the fall Salmon run in the river.

The DNR is urging anglers to avoid walking on the exposed sand flats, as  $i_{\text{S}}$  \$100 and a lawyer presents they are unintentionally spooking fish, causing them to beach themselves and 470-9191 or 269-468-3837. die before they can enter the river to

The DNR said Michigan offers plentiful game opportunities for hunters this season. Giving an outlook for the big game animals, the DNR said this deer season an estimated 650,000 hunters will take to Michigan's fields and forests

Last year hunters took an estimated 422,000 whitetails statewide and roughly half of the deer harvest in recent years has come from the southern Lower Peninsula. The deer population in the northern regions of the state is expected to be higher than last year as deer numbers in most areas of the Upper Peninsula and northern Lower Peninsula continue to rebound on the heels of three mild winters in a Jefferson's favorite plant. row since the harsh winters of 2007

Southern Michigan has experienced multiple outbreaks of epizootic hemorrhagic disease (EHD) this year, as have many states across the country. Europeans especially relish the roots. They are roasted, ground and flavored with burnt sugar. The mixture is used to make a coffee-like drink. Readers from the World War II generation may remember the widespread use of chicory coffee when regular coffee was in short supply.

I just like to look at them. I have to find them in the morning because by the afternoon the blossoms have closed. As they age the petals' color changes to pink then white.

Goldfinches also enjoy chicory. What could be a cheerier sight than a bright yellow goldfinch pecking on a bright blue chicory?!



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
