## PAW PAW LAKE GAINS BOATING FAME

Will Be Represented at World's Fair Races in Chicago Sunday.

Paw Paw Lake is rapidly gaining a reputation in the boating world. Ever since Andy Gantner made a good showing in the national races in California last fall, when he raced under the colors of the Paw Paw Lake Motor Boat Club, the Lake has constantly become better known.

When Stuart Bell entered his "Bottoms Up" in the Star Class races in Peoria, and nearly walked off with the Great Lake championship and the right to enter the Olympic trouts, it was just another step forward to fame for Paw Paw Lake.

Next Sunday Paw Paw Lake and the boat club will be represented at the World's Fair races in Chicago by Andy Gantner and Art and Norman Siegel. All three have had long experience in racing and each should make an excellent showing in the Chicago events, especially Andy, who drives what may turn out to be the boat with the world's record speed. The Eugene McDonald Trophy, which will be awarded to the winner, is reputed to be the most beautiful and most expensive award ever offered.

### DONALD POLMANTEER LOSES ARM IN CRASH

Watervliet Boy Victim of Collision on New 31 Thursday Night

Donald Polmanter, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Polmanter of North Watervliet, was the victim of a serious automobile accident on the new U. S. 31 five miles north of Benton Harbor last Thursday night. Polmanter was riding in a small roadster with three other youths, Frank Brink of Hartford, Edward Lemherr and Anthony Vitulak of Chicago and the light car is said to have been sideswiped by a truck driven by H. Feldman, South Haven farmer. The Watervliet boy was the only one injured in the crash and his left arm was so badly mangled that amputation above the elbow was decided upon by the surgeon in attendance at Mercy hospital, Benton Harbor. Donald is a popular and well known high school athlete and was a member of the graduating class of Watervliet high school in June this year. The young man is not discouraged over his sad mishap and declared to his mother that he was going to college and become a lawyer.

## 63 WILL RACE IN BERRIEN PRIMARIES

Largest List of Candidates Who Ever Sought Nominations in County at a Primary Election—Republicans Have Contests For Every Office But Two—Democrats Have Five Candidates For Sheriff, Four For County Clerk, Three For Treasurer, and Three For Coroners

The primary election on September 13, 1932, gives real promise of being the hottest primary that was ever held in Berrien county, as there are 63 candidates seeking office in Berrien county on the Republican and the Democratic tickets. Thirty-five Republicans and twenty-eight Democrats filed their petitions with County Clerk Benjamin H. Bittner before the time expired on Tuesday afternoon.

That there will be real, live contests in the ranks of both parties is shown by the roster of candidates. The Republicans have three candidates for representatives from the first legislative district, and four from the second. For the office of judge of probate, the Republicans have three candidates and the Democrats two. There is but one candidate in either party seeking the nomination for prosecuting attorney. One of the biggest scraps in the Democratic party will be that for the nomination for sheriff, as there are five men in the race, all well known and all good campaigners. In the Republican fight for sheriff, two old-time rivals—Charles L. Miller and George C. Bridgman will fight it out again, as they did two years ago, with Fred G. Armstrong of Benton Harbor as the third aspirant for that office.

Benjamin H. Bittner stands out alone on the Republican ticket as a candidate for re-nomination for the office of county clerk, while there are five Democratic aspirants for that office. There are three candidates on each ticket for the nomination for county treasurer. Vincent E. O'Neill, who was the Democratic nominee for register of deeds two years ago, has no opposition in the ranks of his own party this year, while there are three candidates on the Republican ticket.

For the offices of circuit court commissioners (two to be nominated) the present commissioners, Stuart B. White and J. T. Hammond, Republicans, will be opposed for re-nomination by John C. St. Clair of St. Joseph, and on the Democratic ticket the fight will be between M. A. Weber and A. D. Wing of St. Joseph. For the office of coroners, there are five aspirants in the Republican ranks and three in the Democratic. For county surveyor, the Republicans have two candidates and the Democrats one.

### Many Seek Re-Nomination

The following candidates, all at present holding office and having been elected from the Republican ranks, seek re-nomination this year: Jesse G. Bogie, representative from the first legislative district; Clarence D. Birchholm, representative from the second district; Benjamin H. Bittner, county clerk; Stuart B. White and J. T. Hammond, circuit court commissioners; Marlon A. Rutherford and Louis Kerlikowski, coroners; and John A. Howard, who was appointed county surveyor to fill out the unexpired of James Hampton, who resigned as a result of the grand jury investigation of the workings of the Berrien county road commission.

### Candidates Well Scattered

The candidates whose names will appear on the primary ballots will represent every section of the county, with the greater number of them coming from Benton Harbor and St. Joseph. Of the candidates, half from Benton Harbor; six from St. Joseph; five from Niles; three from Buchanan, and the others are from St. Joseph township, Sodus, Pipestone and Hazar townships.

### How Many Ballots to Print is Problem

How many primary election ballots for the Democrats is a problem confronting County Clerk Benjamin H. Bittner. In former primary elections in this county there have seldom been any contests for Democratic nominations and consequently the party's primary vote has been extremely light and comparatively few ballots required. This year it is different. With the party leaders having visions of a Democratic ticket and warm contests for all but two or three of the places. The Democratic ticket received over 8,000 votes in the November election two years ago, and Clerk Bittner believes it quite probable that at least that many votes will be cast in the Democratic primary September 13.

### BRUCKER HAS PLENTY OPPOSITION FOR GOVERNOR

Three in Race For Democratic Gubernatorial Nomination

Governor Wilbur M. Brucker faces plenty of opposition in his own party for re-nomination. Those who have filed in the Republican primary are: Governor Brucker, Mayor William H. McKelgan, of Flint, former State Senator James C. Quinlan, of Grand Rapids, and Orin A. Bailey, Shiawassee hitch-hiker candidate, George W. Welsh, Grand Rapids city manager, and Ed A. Nowack, Lansing publisher. The Democratic candidates for governor are: William A. Comstock, Detroit, the party's candidate two and four years ago; Claude Carney, Kalamazoo; Judge Patrick H. O'Brien, Detroit.

Lieut. Governor Luren Dickinson, Charlotte, is a candidate for re-nomination on the Republican ticket and has one opponent in the primary, former State Senator Charles A. Sink, Ann Arbor. Allen E. Stebbins, Ionia, has filed for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor. Candidates for other state offices will be nominated at the party conventions this fall.

### Nine in Congress Race

There are eight candidates, seven men and one woman, who would be willing to relieve John C. Ketcham of the arduous task of representing this—the Fourth District in Congress. Mr. Ketcham, who is a candidate for re-nomination, has two opponents in the Republican primaries. They are: Albert J. Novak, Strugis; William Carey, Dowagiac. On the Democratic primary ballot for congressman will appear the names of six candidates as follows: Roman I. Jarvis, Benton Harbor; Mrs. Minnie Kaltenbrun, St. Joseph; Dr. Raymond Anglemire, Saugatuck; Dr. Swift, Hastings; George Foulkes, Hartford; Charles H. Kimmeler, Cassopolis.

### Only Two For State Senator

For state senator for the seventh district, comprising the counties of Berrien and Cass, there are only two candidates, each unopposed for the party nomination. Senator James G. Bonine of Cassopolis is the Republican candidate and Leon D. Case, Watervliet editor, is the Democratic candidate.

### Jack Bailey Withdraws

J. T. (Jack) Bailey, of the Bailey Co., Benton Harbor, outdoor advertising, and prominent in various civic activities in Benton Harbor, was a candidate for the Democratic nomination for state senator. Just prior to the final date for filing Mr. Bailey announced that he had withdrawn as a candidate and that he would get behind Case of Watervliet in the November election.

### Sheriff's Office Lures Franz Too

The chief law enforcing office in the county has a lure for the Democrats as well as the Republicans, and as a matter of fact the office has been in the hands of the Democrats a little more than half of the time during the last thirty years. Mrs. Jane I. Cutler, the only woman to ever hold the office of sheriff in Berrien county, is the present sheriff and a Democrat. She was appointed to fill the vacancy following the death of her husband, Sheriff Fred J. Cutler, last winter.

### Former Sheriff Fred C. Franz of Niles township, has the distinction of being the only man who ever served as sheriff of Berrien county for more than two terms. Mr. Franz held that office from 1912 to 1916, and was elected another term as sheriff in 1924, serving until the end of 1926. Like former Sheriff Bridgman, former Sheriff Franz admits that the running down of crime has a lure about it for him sufficiently strong to cause him to shy his hat into the Democratic primary ring again this year, although there were several other Democrats ahead of him in filing petitions for the race—James M. Miller, Benton Harbor; John A. Burger, Benton Harbor; Paul Radde, St. Joseph; former Mayor Fred D. Cook, Niles.

For thirty years Franz has been one of the Democratic leaders in the county. During most of that period, when he hasn't been sheriff, he has been connected with Berrien county affairs as a member of the Berrien county board of supervisors, and is at present the member from Niles township. During his long service as supervisor he has been on practically every important committee and was once chairman of the board. He is a grain farmer and stock raiser and on his large farm in Niles township is one of the county's finest herds of Holstein cattle. Supervisor Franz is in St. Ignace this week where he is presiding over the sessions of the state convention of the Michigan Association of Sheriffs.

In filing his petitions the former sheriff said: "I am in to win."

## TWO EX-SHERIFFS IN PRIMARY RACE

Fred C. Franz, Democrat, Three Times Elected—George C. Bridgman, twice Elected.

The final hours for the filing of nominating petitions marked the entrance in the primary race for sheriff of Berrien county of two former occupants of that office. George C. Bridgman, Republican, and sheriff for two terms, filed his nominating petitions on Tuesday, the final date for qualifying.

A few days earlier Fred C. Franz, Democrat, and three times elected sheriff, filed petitions in the Democratic race.

### Bridgman Plans Whirlwind Campaign

Former Sheriff Bridgman is opposed for his party's nomination by two other candidates, Charles L. Miller of St. Joseph, Republican nominee two years ago, and by Fred Armstrong of Benton Harbor, at present deputy commissioner of state police. In qualifying for the primary race Tuesday former Sheriff Bridgman made this statement:

"If I win the nomination and am elected in November there'll be new faces in the sheriff's office. But even more than that I propose to put in an undersheriff and a chief deputy who will work instead of sitting in swivel chairs. I expect to work myself, exactly as I did when I was sheriff before. My idea of saving money in the sheriff's office is to let the chief officers do the work. I can save the salaries and expenses of three deputies by working myself and keeping my assistants going."

Bridgman says the sheriff's office can be easily run 25 percent cheaper than what it is costing now.

### Explains Late Entry.

Bridgman explained his late entry into the sheriff's race with these words:

"I really didn't intend to run this year. My friends began coming to me early last spring and urging that I run. I told them that I didn't care to. As the weeks went on the pressure became stronger, but still I refused. Then they began circulating petitions and finally they brought them to me to convince me that I would find support in all parts of the county. My petitions have been liberally signed and naturally I feel gratified. I won't deny that I would like to be sheriff again. And if I am the next sheriff of Berrien county I'll work on the job as I worked before. I believe the sheriff and his assistants should do the work instead of appointing a lot of deputies. That's the only way that the expenses of the sheriff's office can be cut down."

Bridgman was sheriff of Berrien county from 1921 to 1925 and made a record that won him wide recognition as an aggressive officer. The Benton Harbor News-Palladium in comment on his last minute entry into the race said:

"In those four years he made a record that won him wide recognition as an officer. Some notable criminal cases came his way and these helped to make his reputation. But as a matter of fact he developed an unusual love for police work and this, coupled with his energy and aggressive tactics, soon won him a reputation as an unusual sheriff."

"Before his four years were out Bridgman was widely known beyond the borders of Berrien. The love and lure of the sheriff's game never left Bridgman and so he continued a big factor in politics with an eye always on the sheriff's office. It's no secret that his greatest ambition is to go back to the sheriff's office for another four years. He tried it twice since he retired in 1925 and on this, his third effort, he is supremely confident that he will be successful."

### Sixty Watervliet People Attended Meeting

Sixty Watervliet people attended the camp meeting Sunday and had a picnic dinner on the grounds at noon.

## HERE AND THERE

Wall street apparently believes at this time that Roosevelt will be elected President in November. A news dispatch last Friday stated that betting on the floor of the stock exchange was five to four on Roosevelt, with no Hoover takers. A week previously even money bets prevailed.

The cost of county government in Berrien for the year 1931 was \$57,000 more than for 1930. The increase is accounted for largely in the welfare relief such as the poor fund, contagious diseases, mother's pensions, tuberculosis care and adult afflicted; all of which is chargeable largely to the depression and financial panic that forced many citizens to seek public relief who under ordinary conditions were able to take care of themselves. The board of supervisors has effected substantial economies in all of the county departments which should materially reduce the total of county expenditures for the present year, notwithstanding the fact that the depression is making necessary continued heavy appropriations for care of the distressed and afflicted.

To avert a financial crisis in the affairs of the city of New York, Mayor Walker has asked the 130,000 officials and employees of the country's largest city to contribute one month's pay. The mayor evinced his own willingness to contribute two months' salary.

A glance at the old time news notes in The Record of 30 years ago will show the reader how farm prices now compare with those of the depression and panic of 1893. Pork, potatoes, new wheat and oats were higher, butter approximately the same and eggs lower.

The National Safety Council in a report recently issued gives the total fatal accidents in 1931 as 33,500; non-fatal, 1,290,000; permanent injuries, 100,000. Among the larger states Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan show the greatest reduction in accidents.

Berrien county Republicans continue to lead in the desire to hold public office. In a year when all the signs point to Democratic success at the polls in November, aspirants for office under the Republican label in Berrien county number 35 to only 28 who have filed under the Democratic banner.

## SCOTT MCBRIDE PUT REPEAL ON SPOT

Told Sunday Camp Meeting Through Prohibition Was a Success

A crowd of people that filled the large auditorium on the Crystal Springs camp grounds to capacity heard Dr. F. Scott McBride, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of America, fire the opening gun in the campaign to be waged by the dry forces in the Southwestern Michigan against repeal of the state's prohibition law and repeal of the eighteenth amendment.

It is a Methodist camp meeting and the people present were probably largely of that church denomination, although many others attended to see and hear the national dry leader in action.

McBride told the Methodists that prohibition was a success and that the eighteenth amendment depended on the people of that church and others of like mind on the prohibition question if it was not to fall, and he warned the dries that prohibition forces faced their hardest battle in the approaching campaign.

### Read Records of Candidates

The records of the candidates on the Republican and Democratic tickets for President and Vice President in regard to prohibition were read by the speaker and he said the allied organizations for continuance of prohibition had made no endorsement, but that the prohibition people could judge for themselves.

## WATERVLIET CITY HALL ALL PAID FOR

Notes at First National Bank For \$6,500 Taken Up

Watervliet's new city hall, completed a year ago at a cost of approximately \$13,500 is paid for. Notes at the First National Bank for \$6,500, of which \$6,000 was the deferred payment on money borrowed to pay for the new building, were taken up last Friday by City Clerk Doric C. Hawks from city taxes collected.

### Paid \$2,000 on Water Bonds

The city has also made the payment of \$2,000 on the waterworks bonds due this year and the interest payments. This leaves the only indebtedness of the city \$11,000 still due on the waterworks bonds, issued seventeen years ago. These bonds are falling due \$2,000 a year.

### Tax Money Coming In

City Treasurer C. Guy Curtis reports city tax collections up to last Friday night amounted to \$10,796.05 out of approximately \$20,000 on the assessment roll. August 20 is the final date for the payment of city taxes without extra penalty. A year ago the delinquent city taxes carried over into the winter assessment roll amounted to about \$1300.
