Since Mrs. B. didn't show up with any early copy, this will be short and sweet this week. Those two young-hearted campers, Stanley Monroe and Charley Bush, who just returned from a trip up north, are bursting with such enthusiasm that the Michigan tourist council should send them out as representatives.

When the two couldn't face their outdoor cooking anymore (or maybe it was just that they were already downtown and didn't have time to hike back to the tent for a "cook out") they stopped at the Cozy Corner cafe at Grand Maris. After ordering apple pie, "Doubting Thomas" Monroe was taken back into the kitchen by the lady proprietor to see for himself that the apples in the pie weren't canned. There he saw two baskets of fine apples. One basket label read "Herman Epple" and the other "Clyde Schwarz," both from Watervliet.

Pity the poor lady of the house when the electricity goes off. Look what happens. Saturday night at the Harold Cole house, dishes sat in the sink (electric pump), the cake mix rested in the electric mixer, clothes were in the automatic washer, a load in the electric dryer and not even TV to sit in the dark and watch.

Some 150 to 200 homes in the Watervliet area were without electricity last Saturday evening.

Indiana and Michigan Electric reported that the power failure caused by wind and lightning affected homes in the area from Paw Paw Lake golf course east to M-140 north to Blatchford. Only one third of the I & M customers living in that area were affected, according to C. E. Priebe, assistant district manager, who described the storm trouble as scattered. Priebe said the first call on the power cut-off was reported at 5:30 p.m. Electricity was restored to the majority of the users by 11:30 p.m., but the balance was not in until 2:10 Sunday morning. The Saturday storm caused minor power interruptions throughout the entire district, Mr. Priebe said, but the major interruptions occurred in the Watervliet area.

State Tax Board Reviews Complaint of J. D. Ersman

In a public hearing held at the county courthouse Monday afternoon the State Tax Commission reviewed the complaint of J. D. Ersman for an appeal of the assessment against his premises in Watervliet township.

Ersman was represented by Attorney J. E. Killian of St. Joseph. Killian stated that his client believed that the assessment approved by the township board of review failed to assess such property in accordance with uniform values and to equalize the same adjusting to reflect the ratio of the assessment on other property and that the assessment was not in accordance with laws and statutes provided.

Ersman said he felt his \$4700 assessment was considerably out of line when some of the finer homes in the township were assessed at \$1400.

Watervliet township supervisor Frank Runyon was present with the township attorney Theron Childs representing him. The tax board made no decision Monday but will decide within a month and announce their decision then.

Gladiolus exhibits filled the gymnasium last week end. More than a thousand glads were on display Saturday and Sunday at the annual state gladiolus show held here.

Watervliet's entry in the glad queen contest, Miss Lydia Barnak, was crowned the state gladiolus queen Sunday afternoon. She was selected by registered public vote. Saturday visitors made their choice on the basis of photographs which were displayed.

Exhibitors came from Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and Minnesota and included some of the nation's top flower growers. Highest honors went to B. A. Wendrows of Mt. Pleasant, who received the Achievement Award for the most points in the show in the Floriculture division.

Other award winners were: Floriculture, grand champion, Syd Cartwell, Jr., Bera, Ohio; reserve champion, Earl Hamilton; champion basket, H. C. Kilmark, Coloma; best commercial display, Frank Runyon, Watervliet; best seedling, Cartwell; best exhibit, Mrs. L. Schabel, Okemos, Mich.; longest flower head, Ford & Park, Mt. Pleasant.

Other award winners were: Most ruffled, Ford & Park; smallest floret, M. O. Maynard, Ann Arbor; size champions, B. A. Wendrows, Earl Hamilton, Ford & Park, Cartwell; section champions, Hamilton, Cartwell.

The gladiolus show was sponsored by the Southwestern Michigan Gladiolus Society which is headed by Dwight Horton. Co-managers of the show were Horton, and H. Thomas O'Hara. The Kelly cottage has been purchased by Joe Carver, a Benton Harbor automobile dealer and a longtime friend of Kelly.

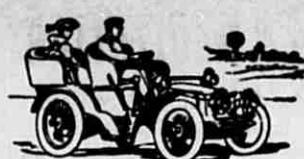
Robert Brown of Benton Harbor served as Toastmaster for the evening and following the dinner gave a fine delivery.

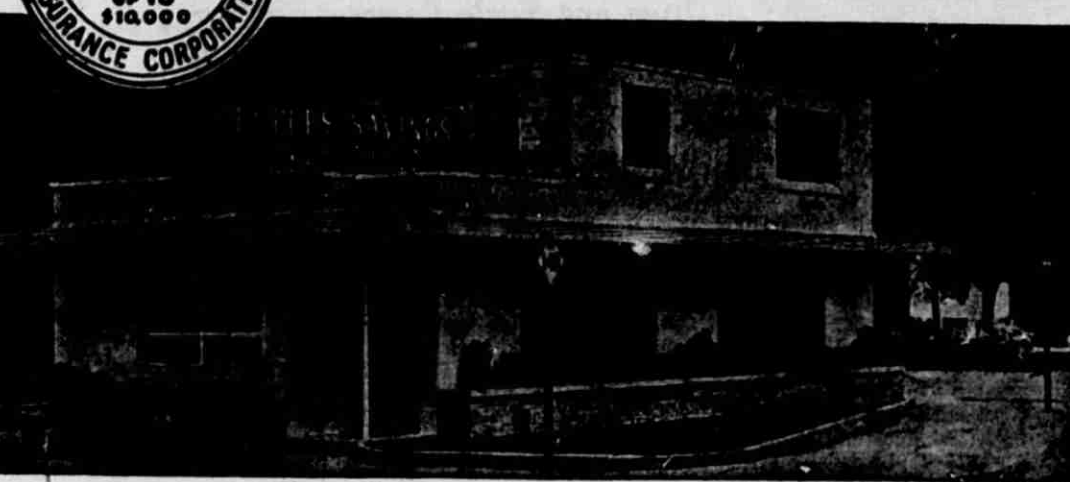

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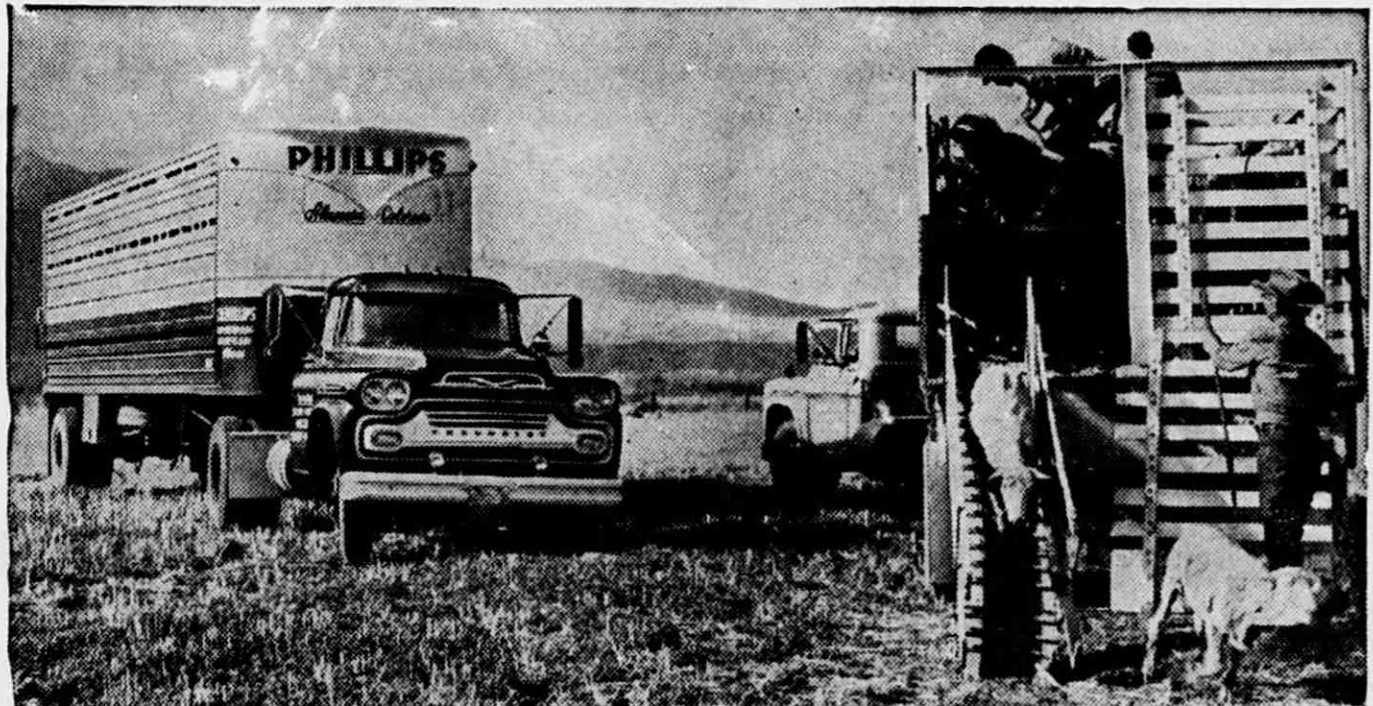

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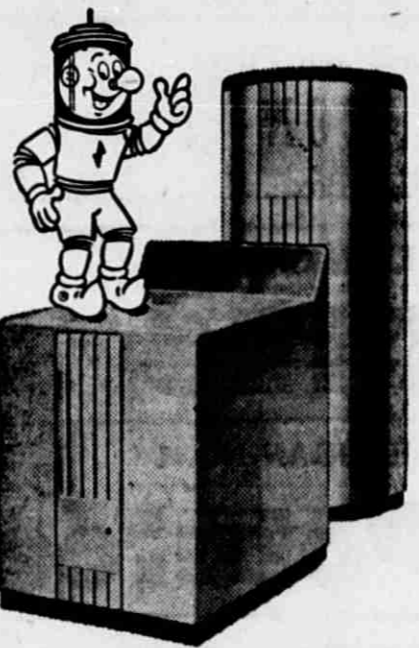

Reminiscing With Pearl Playford

Bangor, over in Van Buren county, is famous for its large apple orchards and yields to no other section for the quality and quantity of apples produced in that locality. Just how apples were introduced into this part of the state is an interesting story that dates back to 1840.

As the story goes, a schooner started from Chicago in the fall of 1840 with a load of apples for northern points. But a big storm arose and the vessel was wrecked off South Haven while seeking shelter in that port.

Apples strewed the beach for miles and folks hastened to get their share. Among them was Orlando Brown, of Bangor, who took home a wagon load but cautioned his family to save the seeds. Those seeds were planted the next spring with the result that he had trees enough to plant

a large orchard and he even had some to spare which he gave to neighbors. From this purely accidental beginning, Bangor orchards have developed into what is now conceded to be one of the most productive apple producing regions in Michigan.

We are told that the Pilgrims brought the first apples to America, but they were inferior in quality and could hardly be called apples. But the Indians liked the fruit the white men had brought and they may have been responsible to an equal degree with the pioneers for planting trees far and wide over the interior.

According to an encyclopedia, all the different kinds of apple trees now in cultivation are usually regarded as mere varieties of the one species which in the wild state is known as the Crab-apple. The trees, supposed to be a native of Southwest Asia, has spread to all temperate climates where the apple has become the most important fruit.

Apples, like everything else, are not the same as in the old days when the Baldwin was one of the standard varieties and was found in every orchard. Then there were the Rhode Island Greenings, Russets, Canada Reds, Snow, Rambows, and the juicy Sweet Boughs that came early, along with the Harvest variety.

These varieties have given way to Jonathans, Delicious, Grimes Golden and others, for which the Michigan Fruit Belt is noted. It is not unusual to pay a nickel for one rosy apple that comes to the local market from a western state. Oh, yes, the apple is beautiful to look at, but the delicious flavor of the Michigan apple is not there.
