Some 150 to 200 homes in the Watervliet area were without electricity last Saturday evening.

Indiana and Michigan Electric reported that the power failure caused by wind and lightening affected homes in the area from Paw Paw Lake golf course east to M-140 north to Blatchford. Only one third of the I & M customers living in that area were affected, according to C. E. Priebe, assistant district manager, who described the storm trouble as scattered. Priebe said the first call on the power cut-off was reported at 5:30 p.m..
