We think the citizens of this state are a progressive, friendly, ambitious, stubborn, proud group of people who contribute greatly to making this the Land of Infinite Variety."

SCHOOL BOARD PAY BILLS, ACCEPT BIDS

Monday night's regular monthly meeting of the Watervliet Board of Education was a lengthy one for the school board members, as they accepted insurance and gasoline bids, approved high school improvements and paid bills amounting to \$11,314.58.

Don Young Agency was awarded the insurance policy on the school's six buses and driver's training car with a low bid of \$366.84. An additional non-ownership coverage was also approved at a cost of \$25, subject to audit. Tom's 66 bid on gasoline and oil was accepted by the board at a price of 20c per gallon of gas, 35c per quart of oil, \$4.75 per gallon for brake fluid, \$2.40 per gallon of anti-freeze, \$2.00 for each bus grease job and \$1.50 for the driver's training car.

Watervliet Schools To Open Sept. 6

Plans for the opening of the 1960-61 school year are nearing completion. From all indications none of the additional classrooms being added to the elementary buildings will be ready for occupancy when school opens September 6 at 9:00 o'clock. Temporary facilities will be provided in the high school building to care for grades 7 through 12. Students in kindergarten through grade 6, including those who attended Penn Yan school last year, will attend the two elementary schools. The all-purpose rooms in each elementary building will be needed un-

til additional classrooms are completed. This crowded condition will be only temporary, with several classrooms available within 3 or 4 weeks after the opening of school. An increase in enrollment is expected to push the total number of students in kindergarten

through the 12th grade to approximately 1260. This is an increase of 61 over last year. Registration for grades 7 through 12 will be held in the high school building and grades Kindergarten through 6 will be held in the elementary buildings. All pupils will register on September 6, beginning at 9:00 o'clock. There will be no school in the afternoon of registration day.

All classrooms are being completely cleaned and many are being painted. The science lecture room in the high school building has been completely remodeled, and a new floor is being laid in the study hall. New furniture also will greet the study hall students.

An attempt is being made through a schedule change and a shorter noon hour to cut down the length of the total school day and at the same time spend essentially the same amount of time in the classroom.

Two New Buses
Two new busses will be in use this coming year, one a replacement and one an additional bus. It will still be necessary, however, for some busses to make two trips as they have in the past.

New teachers who have joined the Watervliet system to date include Maxine Minshall and Otto Helweg, who will teach in the 6th grade.

Junior high teachers are Francis Hartley, James Keech, Nancy Laberdy, and Miriam Sundstrom. Terrence Coburn, Norma Rendell and Celeste Sands will be teaching in high school.

The system is at present shy two elementary teachers, two junior high teachers, and one high school teacher.

Patrons are reminded that used books should be brought to the high school building this week to have them readied for resale when the book store opens. The exact dates and times for purchasing books will appear in the Record next week.

CITY ACCEPTS BIDS FOR 3RD CITY WELL

Plans for a third well for the city of Watervliet were considered again at the meeting of the commission held Tuesday night, August 16.

Representatives from both the Layne Northern Company and the Ohio Drilling were present to give bids for their firms which were \$9372 and \$8412 respectively. Both estimates were for 12" wells of approximately 230 feet, equipped with 500 GPM pump, 20 ft. over screen, 40 HP motors, 70 lineal ft. of water column. Engineer Wightman, who had contacted the Upjohn Company of Kalamazoo, stated that that company had been very well satisfied with the work the Ohio Drilling Company had previously done for them. The mayor called to the commissioners attention the excellent service that Layne Northern had rendered in the past. The water commission made the recommendation to award the contract to the Ohio Drilling Company and it carried.

A bid for a permit to operate a Go-Kart track in the city park was turned down on the grounds of liability in the event of injury.

Ronald Dockter Is Local Winner In Glad Show

Ronald Docktor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Docktor, 431 Lewis, Watervliet, walked off with the sweepstakes honors and reserve championship in the flower arrangement division at Southwestern Michigan's gladiolus show on Saturday and Sunday.

This is the second time Ronald has been a winner in a gladiolus show in this city. Last year at the Michigan State Gladiolus Society show held on August 15 and 16, he was the Sectional Champion winner in the amateur section.

Ronald's winning arrangement was of "orange gold" glads with brown dock, wheat and cattails in the background of the arrangement with a focal point made up of an artificial stuffed pheasant on a small branch of manzanita. The sweepstakes honors were in the state gladiolus section of artistic design and in silver tray. Ronald's entries in the show totaled 11. He also served on the staging committee and on the commercial display committee.

This year there was an increase of 200 people who viewed the displays; last year showed a count of 600 and this year there were approximately 800 people who viewed the 500 entries.

Atty. Barney Wendrow, Mount Pleasant, placed entries which took the first eight ribbons in

the horticulture division and three section championships. Other winners the judges selected are as follows:

Combine Mishap Fatal For Little Fawn

A minor catastrophe occurred Saturday, August 13, at the Fred Seron farm south of Watervliet.

Mr. Chris Schroeder was combining a wheat field in the early afternoon when he thought he heard a strange cry from behind. Looking back he observed a spotted fawn lying in the field. The small, helpless animal, which was still living, had apparently been run over by the tractor or combine wheels. After lifting the fawn in his arms Mr. Schroeder could clearly see that its back legs were broken. He took it to his home on Rt. 1 where he called the Conservation Department.

After Mr. Schroeder had left one of the other men noticed the mother of the young animal looking through the field for it. Despite the care it received, the fawn died on Sunday. The only living survivor we have record of is the mother who was still searching for it Tuesday.

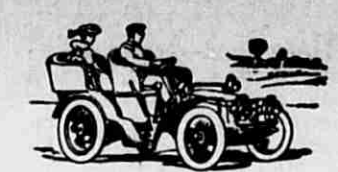
The graduation exercises, marking the end of nine weeks of "boot camp", included a full dress parade and review before military officials and civilian dignitaries.

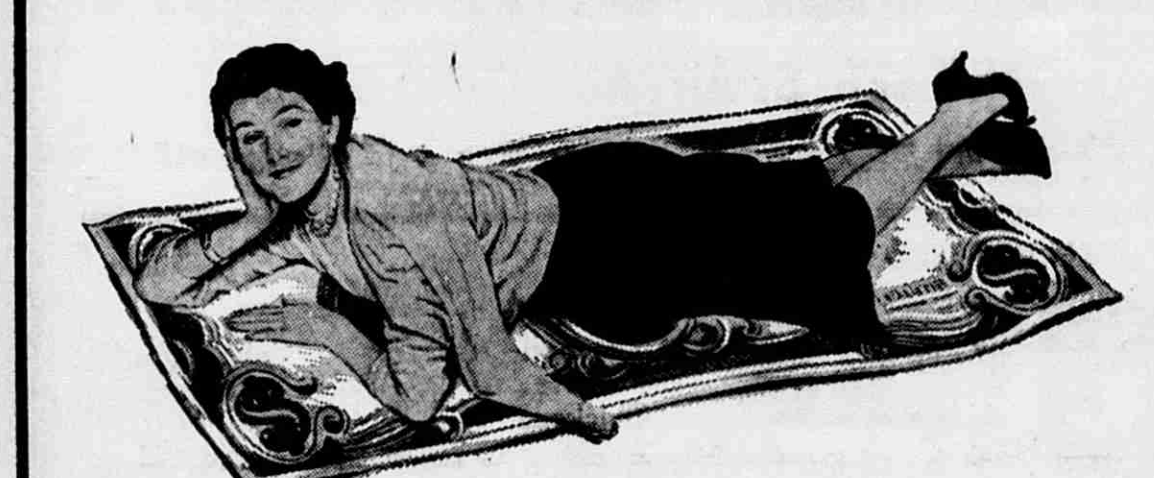

Reminiscing With Pearl Playford

Camp Watervliet, meaning "Valley of the Water," is located on a private lake, Lake Sherwood, in the heart of the Fruit Belt of Michigan. Two miles north of Watervliet. The camp tract consists of 75 acres and the camp cottages and lodge are built upon the bluff overlooking the lake. Big Paw Paw Lake lies only a quarter of a mile from camp and Paw Paw River is less than a mile away; Lake Michigan, with its unusual shoreline and high sand dunes and wind-swept beaches, is only four miles distant.

The camp, a private camp for girls, is entering its 26th year. It was established by Dr. and Mrs. Henry Tatter and its program possesses true educational value, and its ideals, say the sponsors, are: "To make girls so happy they will share their happiness with others. To make friendships which will last through life; to develop strong bodies through regular exercise, good food and rest; to create a love of God's out-of-doors and a reverence for His handiwork; to bring out the possibilities which lie within each girl and to help her to find herself." Counselors are selected for their ability to carry on suitable programs for the activity which they supervise.

The camper has a choice of sports, and participation is regulated by her fitness and proficiency. Individual development is stressed, with the proper amount of team work. No camper is allowed to exceed her own pace and strength. Drama, music, poetry and relaxation have an important place in the program.

Of course, the camp's first consideration is health, say the sponsors. Each girl is required to report daily to a registered nurse, and by the end of the season the girls should show that they have been benefitted by life out of doors, regular periods of rest every day, and

by well-balanced, plenty of and nutritious food, planned by a trained and experienced dietitian. Sun baths are among the health giving features, and they are supervised by the registered nurse. Camp Watervliet welcomes all girls of fine character and gracious manner, and they come from far away to spend eight weeks each summer at this natural beauty spot. Many of these girls have been coming summer after summer. There are at the camp this year 100 girls and a staff of 25.

Activities include boating, diving, fishing, life saving, sailing, swimming, horseback riding twice a week, archery, arts and crafts, baseball, dramatics, posture, tennis, trail cookery, volley ball and weekly trips to points of interest. Birthdays are observed in camp and a banquet is served at the close of the season, and that time is drawing near.

Vesper services are held each Sunday evening, which is non-denominational. Catholic girls attend St. Joseph's church on Sunday mornings and those of other faiths attend worship services in the churches of their choice. Much more could be said about Camp Watervliet. But suffice to say Dr. and Mrs. Tatter are doing a splendid work and Watervliet is to be congratulated that they chose this area for their camp.

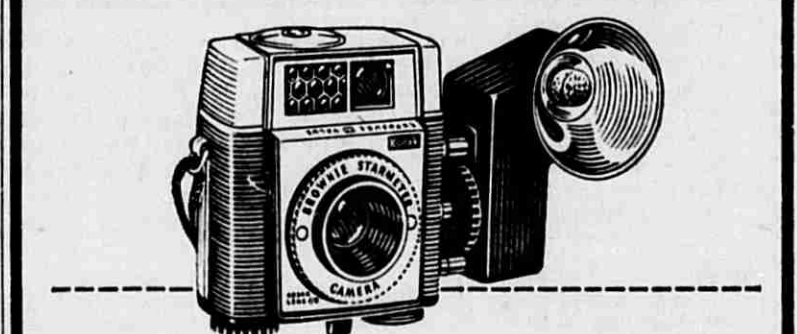

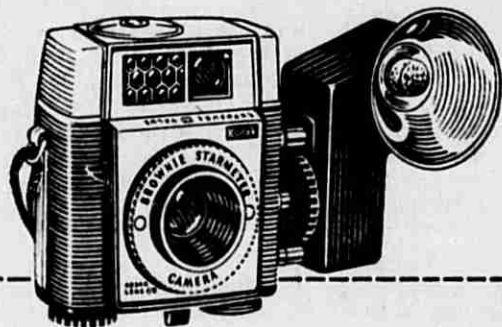

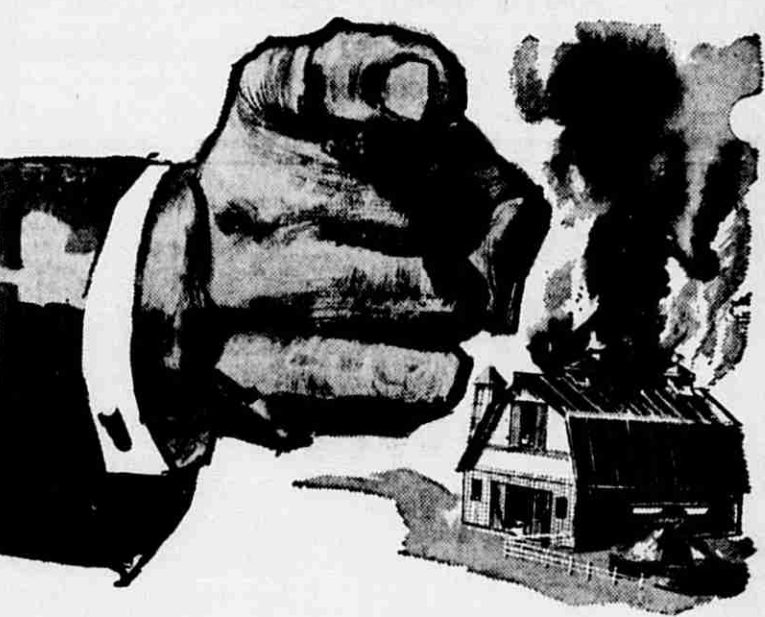

purchase of 100 new fiberfoam study desks for high school assembly hall from Brunswick Furniture for \$2300 and also voted \$824.80 to have new asphalt tile flooring laid in the assembly room. With the gas company's decision to discontinue their practice of supplying school stoves, the board decided to buy a new refrigerator to replace the old gas model in the high school home ec. kitchen. They agreed on a 12 cubic foot Whirlpool with an 87 pound capacity freezing chest from West Michigan Electric at cost for \$187.99. The gas stove will be replaced with an electric model from Indian & Michigan who install electric stoves in school home economics kitchens at non cost or charge for the stove.

After Board President Elliot Spreen said Watervliet was the only school in Southwestern Michigan to furnish football shoes, the members all voted to no longer purchase shoes. Athletic insurance was tabled until next week. In other action, six Bainbridge Center students were accepted as high school tuition students. Bus routes have not been made out yet, but tuition students will be required to pay a transportation fee.

With the state aid payments paid in full, board members heard the general operating fund has more than \$91,000. A special school board meeting will be held next Monday evening to discuss athlete's insurance and the annual audit report.
