The small, helpless animal, which was still living, had apparently been run over by the tractor or combine wheels. After lifting the fawn in his arms Mr. Sch-roeder could clearly see that its back legs were broken. He took it to his home on Rt. 1 where he called the Conservation Department.

After Mr. Schroeder had left one of the other men noticed the mother of the young animal looking through the field for it. Despite the care it received, the fawn died on Sunday. The only living survivor we have record of is the mother who was still searching for it Tuesday.
