Jerry Lewis Skate-A-Thon to benefit Muscular Dystrophy to be held at Crystal Roller Rink

COLOMA — Coloma fire fighter Rudy Appel, chairman for Muscular Dystrophy March in Coloma, announced that Crystal Roller Rink would hold a 24 hour Jerry Lewis Skate-A-Thon for Muscular Dystrophy.

Rink owners Edward and Helen Cerny said that the Skate-A-Thon would start at 1:00 p.m. on July 26 and run until 1:00 p.m. on July 27.

Mr. Cerny also said the skaters who wished to take part in the event could pick up instructions and sponsor sheets at the rink at Paw Paw Lake anytime during the rink's open hours, and that trophies and Jerry Lewis watches would be awarded to skaters obtaining the most sponsors and most dollars for the

Skate-A-Thon.

Mrs. Cerny stressed the fact that sufficient adult supervision would be on duty at all times with the help of Coloma firemen, and that food and drink would be available at the snack bar at all times.

Skaters will be assigned to one of the three teams: red, white, and blue, and each skater will be given twenty minutes rest out of each hour, and no one under 18 years of age would be allowed to leave the building anytime after 10:00 p.m. until 7:00 a.m. on the 30th except with parent or guardian or authorized adult.

Skaters will be required to get sponsors at .50 per hour for the hours they wish to skate, and all skating would be free along with

skates for the 24 hour period.

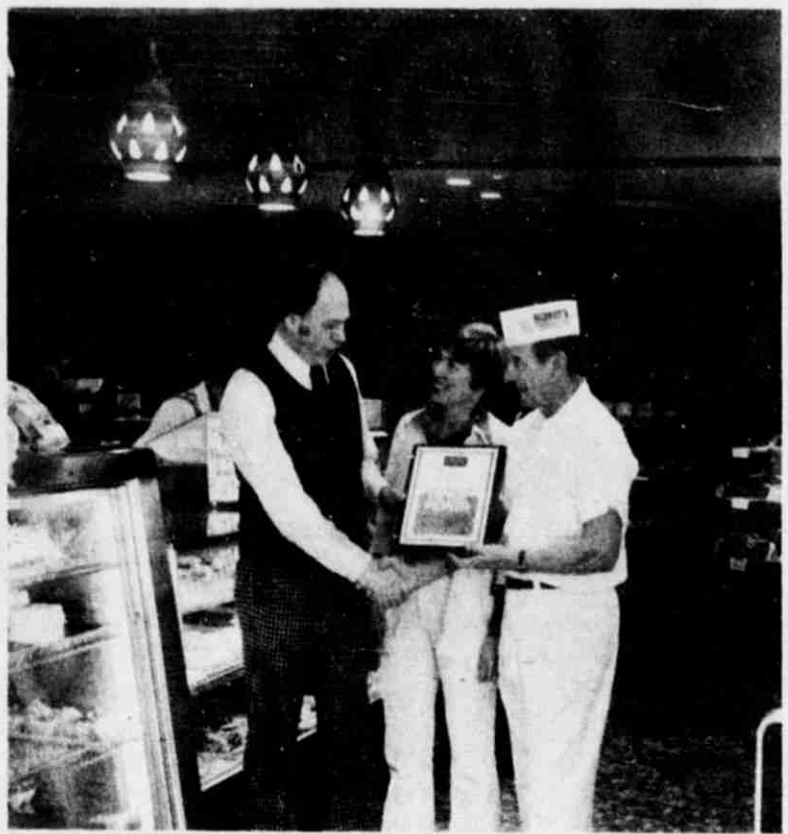

MacKenzie's Bakery wins National award

MacKenzie's Bakery, 421 Phoenix Street, South Haven, Mi, was chosen "Retailer of the Month" by the nation's leading bakery industry magazine, *Bakery Production and Marketing*.

The bakery, owned by J. G. MacKenzie and Don Braschler, was a cover feature of the magazine's May 24 issue. The magazine, located in Chicago, sent Viv Gorman, associate editor, and Frank Gruber, baker editor, to spend two days in the bakery, gathering information and taking photos for the story.

MacKenzie's sells a full line of bakery products, almost 200 varieties in all, from its main salesroom on Phoenix Street and from retail outlets in St. Joseph,

Watervliet and Stevensville, and from island displays in five supermarkets. Most popular sellers are yeast-raised items — fried goods, coffee cakes, sweet dough and Danish rolls and bread.

The shop added a cafeteria that seats 78 next door to the main salesroom three years ago. It has turned out to be a very popular meeting place.

The magazine story stressed that MacKenzie's keeps expanding by searching for the most efficient way to do the job. The six and one-half page story included a large wide-angle shot of MacKenzie's production area and explained how it is laid out for maximum efficiency, minimum cross-over traffic. MacKenzie's methods were of great interest to the 30,000 bakers across the country who read the magazine.

The shop received a special plaque commemorating the "Retailer of the Month" award. It recognized MacKenzie's as "one of America's outstanding retail bakeries" which has "contributed to the improvement of the bakery foods industry for the baker and the consumer."

20 Years Ago

The annual fireman's ball, an event in Coloma for nearly 40 years, will be held Saturday, August 3rd, at Crystal Palace.

The Soulard coach of the Coloma Congregational Church baseball team was honored at a birthday party, Tuesday night at Hayes Park, at Waterliet following the game between Coloma Congo's and the Coloma Lutherans, which was won by the Congo's 27 to 6.

Many Coloma youngsters are missing out on one of the best playgrounds in Southwestern Michigan when they bypass Lions Park as a place to play. A large majority of local children seem contented to play on dangerous streets elsewhere in the City.

Church street residents have objected that route to the proposed new highway every since it was first considered. They have argued that the route would spoil their residential district and all the traffic coming into Coloma from the highway would be funneled past the Congregational and Methodist Churches.

Dr. Otto Helweg named Assoc. Professor

The chancellor of the University of California at Davis announced that Dr. Otto Helweg has been promoted to the rank of Associate Professor which is a tenured position. Professor Helweg was cited for innovative instructional methods and gaining a national reputation in Water Resources Planning, especially in the area of groundwater quality in irrigated areas. Recently Professor Helweg was awarded a \$50,000 research grant for a three-year study of the water quality problems in the Tulare Basin which is the southern part of the California's Central Valley.

Though California's agricultural land area is only 3 percent of the National total, it leads the nation in agricultural income,

over \$3 billion annually. The Central Valley area produces over 30 percent of the Nation's commercial vegetables and over half of the commercial nut tree output.

Klett Construction is low bidder for Watervliet street job

WATERVLIET — The Watervliet city commission accepted the low of three bids for improvements on 24 streets in the city at their meeting held July 5th.

Accepted was the low bid of Klett Construction Co., Hartford, at \$33,368. High bid was from John G. Yerington construction Co., Benton Harbor, for \$39,931.

The street work includes cleaning, coating, bituminous concrete paving and raising manhole covers on the streets. Work is expected to begin in about two weeks.

In other action, the council approved purchase of two pieces of used equipment for the street department at a total cost of \$12,300.

The action authorizing the purchase came in spite of a report from commission member Albert Steffens that city purchases amounting to more than \$500 must be put out for bids, according to city charter.

In authorizing the purchase,

the commission stipulated that it would advertise for bids on similar used equipment and act on them after they are received.

The equipment includes a 1954 street sweeper at a cost of \$6,500 from Bell Equipment Co., Grand Rapids, and a backhoe at a cost of \$5,800 from Alden White and sons, Watervliet. The sweeper replaces a 1921 model. The city currently contracts out work requiring a backhoe.

The council accepted the lone bid of \$365 from Ted Elsner Tree Service, Coloma, for removal of four dead trees on four streets.

The council discussed blockage of streets at Chessie System railroad train crossings, but took no action. City Clerk Fred Johnson noted that recently crossings had been blocked for as long as 20 minutes.

Mayor Arvid Frazier told the commission that "Perhaps we should ticket them (Chessie System railroad)", but that may create more problems than it

solves. City ordinance limits trains blocking crossings for five minutes.

Frazier said he felt rail officials were doing "all they can" to prevent problems in the city.

Steffens said the recent blockage was caused by malfunctions of equipment on the trains. Recently city officials talked with rail officials about deteriorating condition of the train crossing in the city, particularly at the M-140 crossing. Rail officials have promised the city that improvements would be made beginning in August.

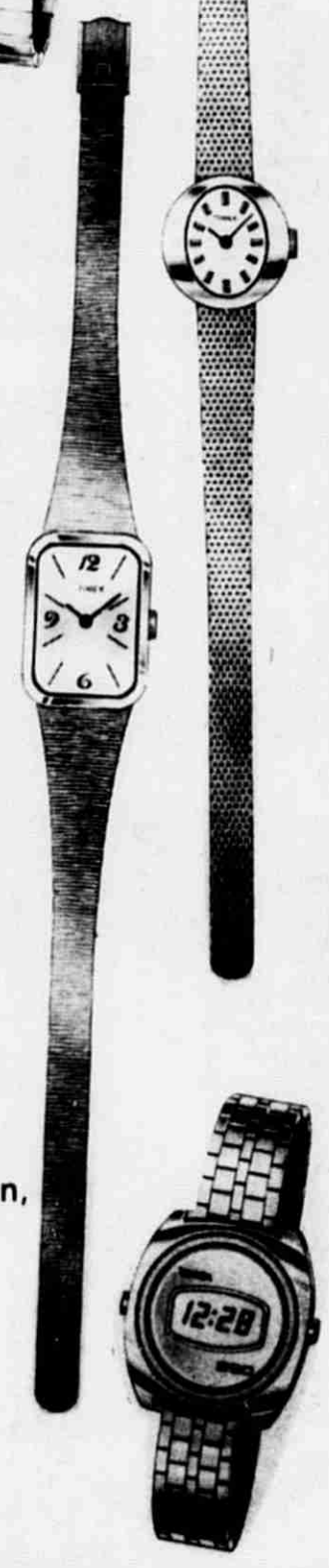

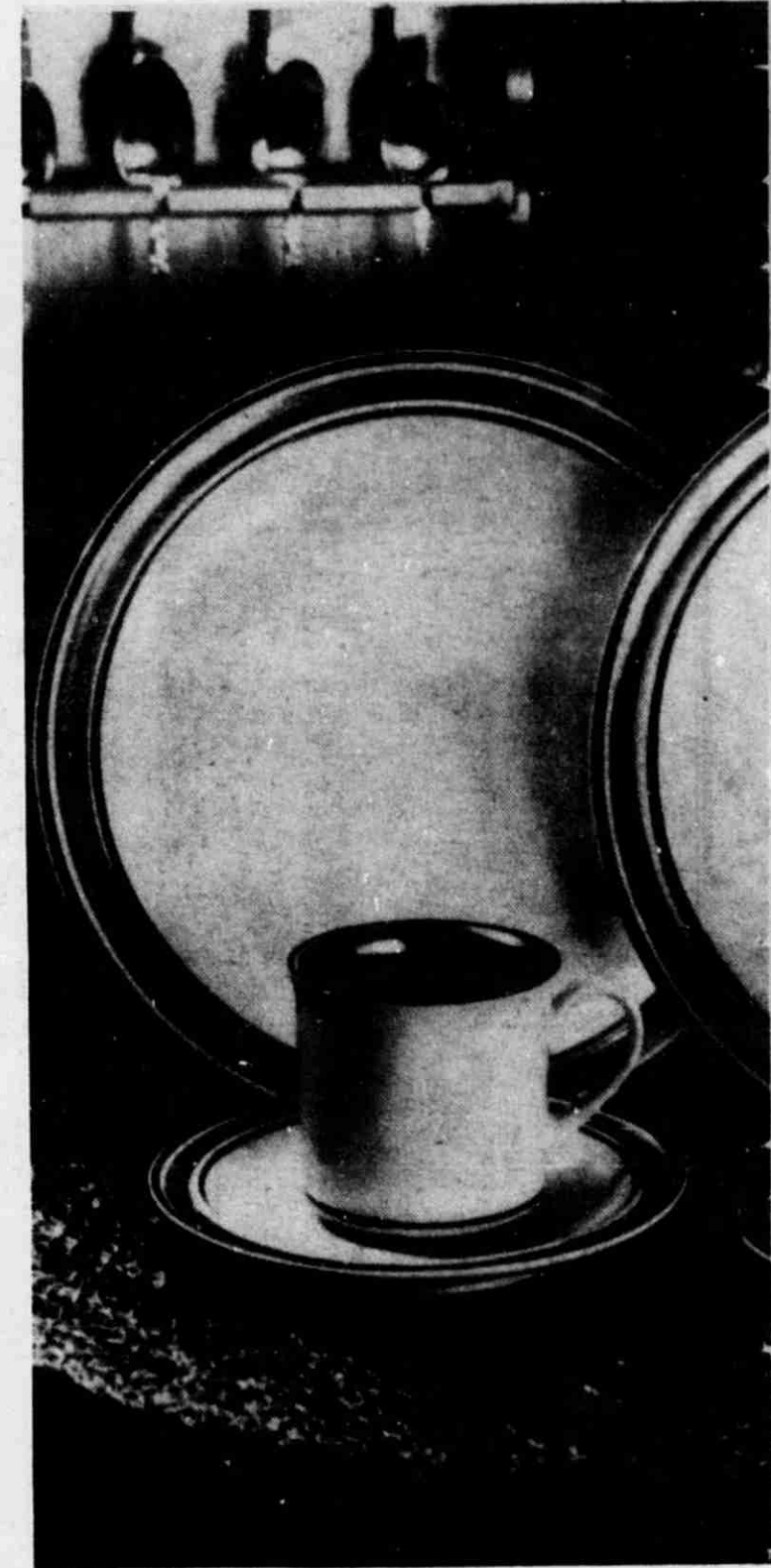
