Dave DeFields to be next superintendent of Coloma Schools

By Marion Leedy Dave DeFields, Coloma's Assistant Superintendent, became Coloma's new Superintendent on Wednesday, April 6, by a unani-mous vote of the Board of Education. He submitted his application to the Board on March 21, 1994. He was one of two district employees interviewed Monday night for the post.

The other candidate was Coloma High School teacher Paul Foss.

DeFields, 51, will replace Clifford Tallman, who is retiring after eight years in the position.

He will begin with an annual \$69,500 salary. DeFields now earns \$60,000 per year. "I feel he has the leadership to

tackle the low morale and division in the school district," Board member Lois Jordan said. In his application, DeFields

wrote: "Integrity, loyality and trust are key to effective relations whether they are with student, staff, Board or community members. I believe I have demonstrated these characteristics consistently at all levels in positions of teacher, coach, counselor, assistant principal, principal, director of instruction and assistant superintendent ... I have been involved in decision-

making roles in the military, business and education. I have also taken a leadership roll in teaching, recruitment, collective bargaining, curriculum development, and school improvement. I have demonstrated my desire to remain current in my profession by earning

Fix it or close it \$90,230 approved to repair WHS's track

By Lori Harris Cramer The Watervliet School Board, at its meeting held Monday, April 11, approved a \$90,230 track reconstruction project.

The 400-meter, six-lane running track, now 25 years old, has deteriorated to the point of either discontinuing use and completely letting it go or fixing it.

It has been a matter of many discussions by the School Board and school officials and is an expense which has been put on hold repeatedly, due to financial conditions and other more pressing concerns. However, facing the total loss of track facilities, the Board felt it too valuable an asset to let go.

It was pointed out by Athletic Director Andy Saetre it might be prudent to set aside each year an amount toward keeping the track in good condition, so that in future years when repairs are needed it will not be such a large sum to come up with all at once.

The job of reconstruction goes to Klett Construction, with a payment plan of \$50,000 to be paid upon completion of the project and with the balance to be paid within twelve months of the completion date with no interest charged.

The money received is donated periodically, based on 1% of the total amount of sales on receipts turned in to the Watervliet District Library and Watervliet school libraries. The donation is then divided between the Jr.-Sr. High Library, North School and South School libraries, and Watervliet District Library.

Watervliet Harding's has participated in this program since 1988. The Board accepted a letter of

retirement from Ann Shembarger. Shembarger taught for fifteen years, teaching third grade at South School and later was the Chapter 1 teacher at North School. She was granted a leave of absence two years ago and now finds she needs to seek retirement.

Also retiring is Rose Simaz who has taught since 1983 for North Berrien Adult Education. The Board also accepted a letter of resignation from Adult Education teacher of nine years Jerry Farwell, along with the letter of resignation from Beatrice Van Winkle, a five-year South School second-grade teacher. Van Winkle will be leaving the area.

Applications for the position of North School Principal to replace outgoing Dave Coffeen will be accepted until April 22. To date, approximately ten applications have been received and interviews are scheduled to begin the first week of

Bob Fishburn of Watervliet: "Sure, because you go watch them play. It's their abilities, not the owners."


